weeks straight. That was when Tupac and R. Kelly had hot tracks out.

You've opened for a lot of people like Lil' Kim and LL Cool J. Tell me about your stage show.

LATEEFA: We was on the LL Cool J tour for seven dates in Canada with about 3,000 white people. Man, that was the wildest experience! LL Cool J got a crowd full of women that want to see him come take his shirt off and lick his lips. And we come out here with the hip-hop and everyone's feelin' it: goin' crazy, throwin' their hands

in the air, tryin' to grab us on the stage, the whole nine. We couldn't walk through the crowd. It was wild like that.

What's the dynamic like between you two?

LATEEFA: This girl [Rashawnna] got crazy delivery. You know how Busta make you feel what he's saying 'cause of how he's sayin' it? Her delivery is out of this world, and that's what makes me learn from her. I'm more, "Let me explain to you what makes my apples sweet," so what I might say kinda hits 'em harder. Niggas be like, "Oh that's some deep shit she said right there." But some-

times, it'd be in a situation where the shoe is on the other foot. Even on "Here I Go" [the first single from their debut album], like I'm rappin' regular and she's snipin' it. You can't help but just start jumpin', bouncin' and want to tear something up 'cause of the energy.

So what sets Infamous Syndicate apart from other rap groups?

RAWSHAWNNA: We some hustlas. We sit back and we be peepin' the game. We not out here trying to jump on the first things we see. We been laying back and watchin' for a long time and now we're ready to do our thing.


